On Sunday, a meeting of the international extreme right took place in Madrid, capital of Spain, sponsored by the VOX party with the aim of collecting votes for the European Parliament elections on September 9th.

In my opinion, the result of this conclave, where industrial quantities of hatred and shamelessness were distilled, will have a result diametrically opposite to that expected by Santiago Abascal and his army because all the norms of peaceful coexistence, ethics and common sense were violated there.

Although Europe is still old, but no longer as cultured or as wise, neither of these two did VOX a favor, if the issue was about raising votes for the European Chamber.
